CALL TO ORDER

Chair Dave Jewitt called the meeting to order at 3:04 p.m., and welcomed everyone in attendance, both in person and virtually to the last meeting of the year.

Bill 23 and Letter to Municipalities

Brian Horner, General Manager, advised a letter was recently sent to member Municipalities and Partner Counties regarding the changes to Plan Review and Permitting Services that may result from Bill 23 – *More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022.* This letter notes that the various services, which may be affected, will still be offered as usual until regulations have been published.

Parkhill Dam Hydro and Telephone Service Update

Geoff Cade, Water and Planning Manager, provided a verbal update on the Hydro and Telephone line at the Parkhill Dam, which was inadvertently severed during construction of a new watermain in Parkhill. The connections have now been restored. Board members

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wondered about the cost of reconnecting the lines; however, ABCA has not received any information on cost or an invoice as of yet.

PROGRAM REPORTS

1. (a) Development Review

Daniel King, Regulations Coordinator, presented the Development Review report pursuant to Ontario Regulation 147/06 *Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses.* Through the application process, proposed developments within regulated areas are protected from flooding and erosion hazards. Staff granted permission for 8 *Applications for Permission* and 4 *Minor Works Applications*.

Geoff Cade reported that there are still several violations before the courts. Two are expected to be resolved shortly. The landowner involved in a violation in Lambton Shores has now pled guilty; however, the court process is continuing regarding restoration of the area. In addition, a those involved in a violation in Central Huron have provided further information and it is expected that resolution should follow shortly.

2. <u>Conservation Authorities Act Update</u>

Brian Horner provided an update on the ongoing implementation of the *Conservation Authorities Act* Update. He reported that staff have prepared the Quarterly Progress Report for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), which will be sent before the end of the year. In addition, staff have incorporated feedback from municipal staff into the draft Cost Apportioning Agreement for Category 3 programs and services. Finally, the approved Fee Policy has been posted on the ABCA Governance webpage.

3. Cost Apportioning Agreement for Category 3 Programs and Services

Through the Conservation Authorities Act, Conservation Authorities are enabled to provide programs and services to municipalities it determines are advisable to further the purposes of the Act. This will be done through a Cost Apportioning Agreement (CAA) between municipalities and the Conservation Authority. ABCA staff have met with staff members from all twelve member municipalities to discuss an initial draft agreement. Municipal staff were supportive of the agreement and provided feedback that was incorporated into the draft.

The next step is for ABCA staff to distribute the draft CAA to municipal councils in the first quarter of 2023, and staff will be available to attend council meetings to discuss the CAA. Councils will have the opportunity to consider and decide which services they wish to have in their agreement. It is hoped that all municipalities will support all service areas: Watershed and Sub-Watershed Plans and Projects; Environmental Monitoring and Research; Watershed Stewardship and Restoration; and Conservation Education and Community Outreach. The ABCA Transition Plan calls for agreements to be signed in summer 2023 in order to inform the 2024 ABCA budget process. The annual budget and levy will continue to be approved by the Board of Directors. A copy of the Draft CAA template was provided to all Board members. Staff have suggested that the first agreement be for five years, to account for the next council, and then every four years to ensure that each subsequent council has an opportunity to review the CAA.

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Marissa Vaughan asked that the Cost Apportioning amounts for each municipality be included in the draft CAA, as it is likely that councils will want to see what each municipality would contribute, and it makes the process more transparent for municipalities. In addition, some Board members noted that a five year initial agreement may be too long, and councils may want a shorter agreement to begin.

Brooklyn Rau, Stewardship Technician, provided a brief update on new stewardship projects funded by the Canada Nature Fund. In the Ausable River watershed, 2 additional fragile land retirement projects received funding, along with 1 cover crop project. In the Bayfield River watershed 1 erosion control project received funding, as well as 22 cover crop projects.

5. Education Update

Denise Iszczuk, Conservation Educator, provided an end-of-year summary of education and outreach in the watershed. Some of the highlights included higher participation in all conservation programs and increase student participation in the River and Flood Safety program. Summer Day camps remained popular with 2 full-week day camp programs, along with 6 one-day programs held at Morrison Dam Conservation Area, Rock Glen Conservation Area, and Clinton Conservation Area. Conservation education programs were delivered to 72% of all watershed schools, the majority of programs being held in May and June, as well as October and November. Overall, conservation education and outreach programs remain popular in the watershed, and staff were encouraged by high participation in 2022.

6. 2023 Watershed Report Card

Hope Brock, Healthy Watersheds Technician, and Cristen Watt, Water Quality Technician, presented a report on the 2023 Watershed Report Cards. Every five years, Conservation Authority staff publish a report card for their watersheds in partnership with Conservation Ontario. The newest edition of the Watershed Report Cards for the Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority will be published in March 2023. The report cards provide a

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summary for each subwatershed using several indicators, including: *E. coli*, benthic macroinvertebrates and phosphorus for water quality; forest cover, streamside cover and forest interior for forest conditions; chloride and nitrate levels for groundwater; overwinter vegetation; and, wetlands. Conservation Ontario sets out the methodology for most indicators to ensure that watersheds are comparable across Ontario. The final Watershed Report Cards for the Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority will be released in March 2023.

Subject: Conservation Authorities Act Update - Progress Report

This report provides an update on the implementation of the Conservation Authorities Act and associated regulations. Additional information may be available at the board meeting.

- 1. In December, staff submitted the Quarterly Progress Report for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), prior to the January 1, 2023 due date.
- 2. The Draft Cost Apportioning Agreement for Category 3 programs and services was sent to the municipalities earlier this month, with the respective board members copied on the email. The next step is for ABCA staff to attend meetings of the municipality upon request. The transition plan identifies Summer 2023 for signing the agreements.
- 3. Staff are starting the Watershed-Based Resource Management Strategy and Conservation Areas Strategy. Both projects are Conservation Authorities Act requirements.

Subject: Bill 23 - More Homes Built Faster Act

Impacts to ABCA Planning Services
Natural Heritage Commenting

Member municipalities are all working to understand and adjust to the impacts of the Bill 23. This bill revised a number of pieces of legislation including the Conservation Authorities Act. Some of the Conservation Authorities Act changes are now in effect, some remain pending.

On January 1, 2023, through Bill 23 and O.Reg 596/22, conservation authorities were prohibited from providing advice to their member municipalities on 'non Category 1' (incl. natural heritage) matters when formal proposals are advanced under the following 'Prescribed Acts':

- The Planning Act
- The Condominium Act, 1998
- The Aggregate Resources Act
- The Drainage Act
- The Endangered Species Act, 2007
- The Environmental Assessment Act
- The Environmental Protection Act
- The Ontario Heritage Act
- The Ontario Water Resources Act
- The Niagara Escarpment Planning & Development Act

This prohibits the ABCA from providing its municipalities natural heritage advice when reviewing applications made under the acts identified above. This is a service which the ABCA has provided to its member municipalities for decades.

Conservation authorities across the province have been working with upper and lower tier municipalities to help with transition and to explore possible avenues to continue providing natural heritage support. From discussions with its watershed planning authorities ABCA staff understands that while some wish the ABCA to explore options, others do not.

It is recognized that natural heritage planning is best, and most efficiently, addressed on a watershed scale. However, it is difficult, considering the files involved and the sporadic implementation, to provide this service to only a portion of the ABCA watershed. As a result, staff is advancing a transition protocol which will see the ABCA ceasing to provide natural heritage comments under the *Prescribed Acts* listed above. The proposed transition protocol is outlined below for the Board's approval.

1.) For applications received on or after January 01, 2023:

The ABCA will limits its comments as per Bill 23 and O.Reg. 596/22. The ABCA will provide comments as required to ensure file compliance with provincial and ABCA hazard guidelines / policies and Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act.

These are comments identified on the attached Table 1 (attached) as 'permitted'

The ABCA, where appropriate, will continue to provide full comments <u>as a landowner</u> where it has identified a concern that a proposal will negatively impact the natural hazard and natural heritage characteristics of one of its own properties.

2.) For applications received prior to January 01, 2023:

For all activities listed on Table 1, the ABCA will provide advice and transition support until March 31, 2023 - *only* where there is full concurrence from the applicant, the municipality and the ABCA. If there is no concurrence, the ABCA will limit its review and comments as identified in bullet 1, above.

After March 31, 2023 the ABCA will no longer supply support on those activities listed as 'not permitted' on Table 1. It is very important to note that this applies only to those applications subject to the 'Prescribed Acts' in O.Reg. 596/22.

3.) Files to be considered on a case by case basis:

Available information suggests that Bill 23 and O.Reg. 596/22 prevents conservation authorities from clearing *some* conditions in those agreements where the authority is a named party (for example, Draft Plan Conditions). In those cases further discussions with the municipality will be required.

Again, as outlined, this only affects those files which are subject to the prescribed acts. It is important to note that the number of planning applications impacted is relatively small and there are no budgetary impacts and no other programs of the ABCA will be affected.

It is also important to note that the ABCA still retains decades of watershed science, experience and knowledge crossing several natural heritage disciplines.

Recommendation:

That the Board of Directors approve the proposed transition plan.

Restoration and mitigation for Ausable River Species at Risk (SAR) in Ontario

Date: February 16, 2023

Background

The draft Ausable River Recovery Action Plan (2018) has reconfirmed that the two main threats to aquatic species at risk (SAR) in the Ausable River are nutrient enrichment and sediment deposition. The primary goal of this multi-year project is to improve aquatic habitat in the Ausable River for SAR freshwater mussels and fishes.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) is providing \$250,000 in funding for the 2022-2023 project year. Stewardship activities will include working with watershed residents for up to five wetland restorations; up to 17 tree planting sites; up to 1,200 acres of cover crops; and up to five sediment and nutrient reduction activities (fencing out livestock and WASCOBS). As well as monitoring SAR fish and the SAR mussel fish hosts at six long term index stations and education and outreach in the Ausable River watersheds.

Funding rate is 50% of project costs. However, where projects meet the eligibility requirements of both programs the federal and provincial funding can be stacked to recover up to 100% of project costs.

Improving freshwater habitat for species at risk in the Bayfield watersheds

Date: February 16, 2023

Background

Aquatic Species at Risk (SAR) are also known in the Bayfield River and two Lake Huron shoreline tributaries (Gully Creek and Unknown Stanley J Drain). Aquatic SAR in these rivers face many threats to their survival and recovery (sediment loads, nutrient enrichment, altered flow regime, low oxygen concentrations and invasive species).

This project involves a three-pronged community approach. Best management practices on private lands include: tree planting, wetland restoration, implementing erosion control on ephemeral channels and supporting cover crops to prevent the development of these channels. The second approach is monitoring SAR, their habitat and the effectiveness of different practices on the reduction of downstream sediment and nutrients. Finally, ongoing communications about the project helps to raise awareness about the SAR, threats to their survival, and the approaches being taken to address these threats.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) is providing \$121,825 in funding for the 2022-2023 project year. Stewardship activities will include working with watershed residents for up to two wetland restorations; up to three tree planting sites; up to six sites of 782 ha of cover crops; and up to two sediment and nutrient reduction activities (WASCOBS). As well as providing monitoring of aquatic ecosystems and providing outreach and education to watershed residents.

Funding rate is 50% of project costs. However, where projects meet the eligibility requirements of both programs the federal and provincial funding can be stacked to recover up to 100% of project costs.

Source Protection Committee and Program Update

Mary Lynn MacDonald, Co-Program Supervisor reported that staff have been receiving municipal endorsements of reappointments for the Source Protection Committee (SPC). As required under the Clean Water Act, one third of the SPC must be filled by municipal representatives. This equates to four representatives on the Ausable Bayfield Maitland Valley (ABMV) SPC. Three current SPC members, Paul Heffer and Allan Rothwell (re-elected councillors in 2022), and Dave Frayne (appointed member), were willing to be reappointed to the SPC for another 4 year term and have been confirmed by the Central, East and South West municipal council groups that they represent. The North Municipal Grouping is in the process of determining a new representative after Myles Murdoch stepped down from the SPC due to his appointment to the Maitland Valley Source Protection Authority. The process should be completed by February 9, 2022.

At the end of 2022, SPC member Ian Brebner, Property Owner position, stepped down from the SPC. As such, the vacant position was posted and two applications received. The Joint Management Committee will conduct interviews and will recommend a candidate to the Source Protection Authority (SPA).

The proposed update to the Source Protection Plans in currently in the public consultation phase. The documents are available at www.sourcewaterinfo.on.ca/consultation, and letters were sent to affected landowners. Two open houses were held in Wingham on January 18 and Clinton on January 25, along with a webinar on January 11. Comments will be accepted until February 10, then taken to the SPC at the March 1st meeting. These comments will be reviewed to see if any further changes to the Source Protection Plans are recommended. Pending SPC approval, the amendment will be reviewed by the Ausable Bayfield SPA for submission to the Province before March 31 as per the ABMV Source Protection workplan.

PROGRAM REPORT

1. Program Update

Mary Lynn MacDonald, Drinking Water Source Protection Co-Supervisor, provided a program update for the Ausable Bayfield and Maitland Valley (ABMV) Source Protection Areas. The Source Protection Committee (SPC) met on November 30 to review comments from preconsultation and made revisions to the policies in the proposed Draft Amendment to the ABMV Source Protection Plans. Policy revisions included additional wording that small amounts of waste not related to a business operation do not require a Risk Management Plan; clarification of the collection area for snow storage; future sewage pumping and life stations are no longer prohibited in vulnerable areas; and the future prohibition of organic solvents policy that was changed to requiring a Risk Management excludes residential use.

Other items of note at the SPC meeting include a presentation on a proposed salt storage at the Pier 8 in Goderich, a review of the plan for public consultation for the proposed Amendment to Source Protection Plans, and presentations to retiring committee members Myles Murdock and lan Brebner.

Staff are in the process of receiving reappointments to the SPC from municipalities following municipal elections this fall. In addition, with Ian Brebner's retirement from the SPC, staff have advertised the open position of Property Owner representative. Staff have also sent the interim report to the Province (April – October 2022) and all expenses are on budget as proposed.

Staff were also part of a subcommittee in the province for the production of salt storage stickers. This initiative is to promote the wise use of road salt for small businesses. Stickers will be placed on winter salt storage boxes as a reminder to employees, contractors and the public.

2. Source Protection Committee Update and Reappointments

The SPC directed staff to complete the policy revisions for the Source Protection Policies and begin public consultation.

Subject: Program Updates

a. Source Protection Plan Update

The Proposed Updates to the Source Protection Plans for Ausable Bayfield and Maitland Valley are currently in the public consultation phase. The documents are available at www.sourcewaterinfo.on.ca/consultation. A notice of consultation was emailed to implementing bodies, mailed to over 80 landowners and promoted through social media and newsletters. In addition, a webinar was held on January 11th followed by an in-person Open Houses in Wingham on January 18th and in Clinton on January 25th. Public consultation ended February 10th.

Comments resulting from this consultation period will be taken to the Source Protection Committee on March 1st, to determine if any further changes to the proposed update are required. Pending Source Protection Committee approval at their March 1st meeting, the amendment package will then be reviewed by Ausable Bayfield Source Protection Authority at their March 16th meeting for submission to the province before March 31st as indicated in the Ausable Bayfield Maitland Valley Source Protection Region 2022-2024 Work Plan.

b. Future Changes to Wellhead Protection Areas

• Century Heights (Saltford) Ashfield-Colborne-Wawanosh is adding another well to the Century Heights water supply system in Saltford. The new well is being developed to service new residential developments of potentially 156 lots and improve water pressure in the existing system. A technical report is being completed by their consultant to re-model the Wellhead Protection Area and delineate (map) the system. Delineation modeling shows where and how long it takes water to recharge the well as well as the vulnerable areas around the well.

Once staff receive the technical report, the Ausable Bayfield Maitland Valley Technical Team will review it on behalf of Maitland Valley Source Protection Authority and issue the required 'section 48' notice. Following the required consultation process, the Maitland Valley Source Protection Plan will then be amended under 'Section 34' to include this new well mapping. The Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks will need to approve the amendment to the Maitland Valley Source Protection Plan prior to the new well system

- providing water to properties. It is anticipated that the technical report will be completed by mid-March.
- Lucknow: Huron-Kinloss has submitted an application to the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks to increase their permit to take water for Lucknow. Consultants BM Ross and Matrix are assessing the data to see if the Wellhead Protection Area will require re-modelling as a result of the increased water taking. This is to be completed by mid-March and then the technical team will need to issue a 'section 48' notice for the Maitland Valley Source Protection Authority. Another 'section 34' amendment to the Maitland Valley Source Protection Plan may be needed, if the Lucknow Wellhead Protection Area changes. The usual consultation would have to be completed before the amendment is submitted to Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks for approval.
- Zurich is switching from two groundwater wells to the Lake Huron Primary Water Supply pipeline and will decommission their water supply wells likely in spring 2023. The Ausable Bayfield Source Protection Plan will be updated via a 'section 51' amendment. As no NEW properties are affected by this change it doesn't require consultation and is considered an administrative update.

d. Best Practices – Non-municipal Water Systems

The Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks recently released 'Best Practices for Source Water Protection' – for properties **NOT** covered by the Clean Water Act: https://www.ontario.ca/document/best-practices-source-water-protection. It is intended to provide guidance, tools, and tips to protect private drinking water sources. These systems include cluster wells, condo developments on private water, campgrounds, rural schools and community centres.

The Drinking Water Source Protection workplan for 2023 includes work to promote these new 'best practices' to landowners in our region. Once the Proposed Updates to the Source Protection Plans amendment is submitted to the province staff will start discussions with the Source Protection Committee on a plan to support and promote this new program.

Subject: SPC Committee and Program Updates

a. Municipal Endorsements of Reappointments

As required under the Clean Water Act, one-third of the Source Protection Committee (SPC), four of twelve positions, must be filled by municipal representatives. For the Ausable Bayfield Maitland Valley region, there are four municipal grouping – Central, East, North and South West. Following an election, the municipalities must re-confirm their representative for the SPC

On Oct. 26th, staff sent emails to all clerks in the Ausable Bayfield Maitland Valley Region informing them that a municipal representative to the Source Protection Committee would need to be chosen for their designated municipal grouping. Municipal representatives can be elected officials or appointed persons.

Three current Source Protection Committee members, Paul Heffer and Allan Rothwell, reelected councilors in Oct. 2022, and Dave Frayne, appointed member, were willing to be reappointed to the Source Protection Committee for another 4 year term.

The Joint Management Committee is made up of the Chairs, Vice Chairs and General Managers (non-voting) of both Ausable Bayfield and Maitland Valley Conservation Authorities with the Source Protection Committee Chair as ex-officio. One of the roles of the Joint Management Committee is to interview applicants for the Source Protection Committee and recommend candidates to the Ausable Bayfield Source Protection Authority for vacant non-municipal positions. The other is to approve Source Protection workplans and budgets.

With the retirement of long time Source Protection Committee member, Ian Brebner, the Property Owner position became vacant. Ads were placed in regional papers for the month of December and the notice was added to the Source Protection website, posted on social media and included in the public and municipal newsletters. No applications were received.

The application period was then extended to January 23rd, 2023 and re-advertised on the website, to municipalities and on social media. Two applications were received.
